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the posthuman offers both an introduction and major contribution to contemporary debates on the posthuman digital second life genetically modified food advanced prosthetics robotics and reproductive technologies are familiar facets of our globally linked and technologically mediated societies this has blurred the traditional distinction between the human and its others exposing the non naturalistic structure of the human the posthuman starts by exploring the extent to which a post humanist move displaces the traditional humanistic unity of the subject rather than perceiving this situation as a loss of cognitive and moral self mastery braidotti argues that the posthuman helps us make sense of our flexible and multiple identities braidotti then analyzes the escalating effects of post anthropocentric thought which encompass not only other species but also the sustainability of our planet as a whole because contemporary market economies profit from the control and commodification of all that lives they result in hybridization erasing categorical distinctions between the human and other species seeds plants animals and bacteria these dislocations induced by globalized cultures and economies enable a critique of anthropocentrism but how reliable are they as indicators of a sustainable future the posthuman concludes by considering the implications of these shifts for the institutional practice of the humanities braidotti outlines new forms of cosmopolitan neo humanism that emerge from the spectrum of post colonial and race studies as well as gender analysis and environmentalism the challenge of the posthuman condition consists in seizing the opportunities for new social bonding and community building while pursuing sustainability and empowerment

in a context marked by the virulent return of patriarchal and white supremacist attitudes a

new generation of activists from the xenofeminists to pussy riot are continuing the struggle fighting alongside star feminists like emma watson and scarlett johansson these are very feminist times but how do these and other struggles relate to our contemporary posthuman condition in this important new book rosi braidotti examines the implications of the posthuman turn for feminist theory and practice she defines the posthuman turn as a convergence between post humanism on the one hand and post anthropocentrism on the other and she examines the double impact of these two lines of critical enquiry for contemporary feminist practice in so doing she develops five theses that contemporary feminism is neo materialist and that feminism today is not a humanism that anthropos has been de centered and that non human life zoe is now the ruling concept and that as a result of these shifts of perspective today sexuality can be defined as a force beyond beneath and after gender the book ends with a plea for joyful political resistance calling for embedded and embodied cartographies of the new power relations that are emerging from the current geo political order this bold new text by a leading feminist philosopher will be of great interest to students and scholars throughout the humanities and social sciences

uncovering the theoretical and creative interconnections between posthumanism and philosophies of immanence this volume explores the influence of the philosophy of immanence on posthuman theory the varied reworkings of immanence for the nonhuman turn and the new pathways for critical thinking created by the combination of these monumental discourses with the philosophy of gilles deleuze and félix guattari serving as a vibrant node of immanence this volume maps a multiplicity of pathways from deleuze guattari and their theoretical allies including spinoza and nietzsche to posthuman thought as positions that insist respectively on the equal yet distinct powers of mind and body immanence and the urgent need to dismantle human privilege and exceptionality posthumanism each chapter reveals concepts for rethinking established notions of being thought experience and life the authors here take examples from a range of different media including literature and contemporary cinema featuring films such as enthran the robot india 2010 and chappie usa mexico 2015 and new developments in technology and theory in doing so they investigate deleuzian and guattarian posthumanism from a variety of political and ethical frameworks and perspectives from afro pessimism to feminist thought disability studies biopolitics and social justice countering the dualisms of cartesian philosophy and flattening the hierarchies imposed by humanism from deleuze and guattari to posthumanism launches vital interrogations of established knowledge and sparks the critical reflection necessary for life in the posthuman era

feminist posthumanism in contemporary science fiction film and media from annihilation to high life and beyond places posthumanism and feminist theory into dialogue with contemporary science fiction film and media this essay collection is intimately invested in the debates around the posthuman and the critical posthumanities within a feminist critical theoretical framework in this posthumanist light science fiction as a genre allows for new imaginings of human technological relations while it can also be the site of a critique of human exceptionalism and essentialism in this way science fiction affords unique opportunities for the scholarly investigation of the relevance and relative applicability of specific posthumanist themes and questions in a particularly rich and wide ranging popular cultural field of production one of the reasons for this suitability is the genre's historically longstanding relationship with the critical investigation of gender specifically the position and relative empowerment of women the original analyses presented here pay close attention to audiovisual style including game mechanics facilitating the critical interrogation of the issues

and questions around posthumanism where typically the mention of sf in the posthumanist context calls to mind a whole set of often clichéd tropes the cyborg technologically augmented bodies ai subjectivities etc this volume s thirteen chapters analyze specific examples of contemporary sf cinema that engage in meaningful ways with the burgeoning field of critical posthumanism and that utilize such films to interrogate posthumanist and feminist as well as humanistic ideas

the notion of the posthuman continues to both intrigue and confuse not least because of the huge number of ideas theories and figures associated with this term more posthuman glossary provides a way in to the dizzying array of posthuman concepts providing vivid accounts of emerging terms it is much more than a series of definitions however in that it seeks to imagine and predict what new terms might come into being as this exciting field continues to expand a follow up volume to the brilliant interventions of posthuman glossary 2018 this book extends and elaborates on that work particularly focusing on concepts of race indigeneity and new ideas in radical ecology it also includes new and emerging voices within the new humanities and multiple modes of communicating ideas this is an indispensable glossary for those who are exploring what the non human inhuman and posthuman might mean in the 21st century

the question of what defines the human and of what is human about the humanities have been shaken up by the radical critiques of humanism and the displacement of anthropomorphism that have gained currency in recent years propelled in part by rapid advances in our knowledge of living systems and of their genetic and algorithmic codes coupled with the global expansion of a knowledge intensive capitalism in posthuman knowledge rosi braidotti takes a closer look at the impact of these developments on three major areas the constitution of our subjectivity the general production of knowledge and the practice of the academic humanities drawing on feminist postcolonial and anti racist theory she argues that the human was never a neutral category but one always linked to power and privilege hence we must move beyond the old dualities in which man defined himself beyond the sexualized and racialized others that were excluded from humanity posthuman knowledge as braidotti understands it is not so much an alternative form of knowledge as a critical call a call to build a multi layered and multi directional project that displaces anthropocentrism while pursuing the analysis of the discriminatory and violent aspects of human activity and interaction wherever they occur situated between the exhilaration of scientific and technological advances on the one hand and the threat of climate change devastation on the other the posthuman convergence encourages us to think hard and creatively about what we are in the process of becoming

the devolved and dispersed character of human agency and moral responsibility in the contemporary condition appears linked with the deepening global trauma of inhumanism as a paradox of the anthropocene reclaiming human agency and accountability appears crucial for collective resistance to the unprecedented state of environmental and social collapse resulting from the inhumanity of contemporary capitalist geopolitics and biotechnologies of control understanding the potential for such resistance in the posthuman condition requires urgent new thinking about the nature of human influence in complex interactional systems and about the nature of such systems when conceived in non anthropocentric way through specific readings and uses of deleuze s conceptual apparatus this volume examines the operation of human actioned systems as complex and heterogeneous arenas of affection and accountability this exciting collection extends non humanist concepts for understanding reality agency and interaction in dynamic ecologies of reciprocal determination and influence the outcome is a vital new theorisation of human scope responsibility and potential in the posthuman condition

if art science and the humanities have shared one thing it was their common engagement with constructions and representations of the human under the pressure of new contemporary concerns however we are experiencing a posthuman condition the combination of new developments such as the neoliberal economics of global capitalism migration technological advances environmental destruction on a mass scale the perpetual war on terror and extensive security systems with a troublesome reiteration of old unresolved problems that mean the concept of the human as we had previously known it has undergone dramatic transformations the posthuman glossary is a volume providing an outline of the critical terms of posthumanity in present day artistic and intellectual work it builds on the broad thematic topics of anthropocene capitalocene eco sophies digital activism algorithmic cultures and security and the inhuman it outlines potential artistic intellectual and activist itineraries of working through the complex reality of the posthuman condition and creates an understanding of the altered meanings of art vis à vis critical present day developments it bridges missing links across disciplines terminologies constituencies and critical communities this original work will unlock the terms of the posthuman for students and researchers alike

this exhibition brings together a selection of over 500 works by more than 200 women artists from the beginning of the 20th century up to the present day

walking the mobius strip locates richard powers s fiction at the crossroads of postmodern and post postmodern aesthetics and argues that this paradigm shift shapes the models of knowledge and understanding that underwrite his work the readings of plowing the dark galatea 2 2 and the echo maker are inspired by jacques lacan s image of cognition as a mobius strip on which different forms of propositional and non propositional knowledge bleed into and depend upon one another drawing on feminist epistemology and psychoanalysis this study highlights powers s interest in the non propositional aspects of cognition that is in all that escapes the frameworks of scientific empiricism and can only be known through the mediation of fictional narrative it reveals a deep dissatisfaction in the novels with the suggestion that knowledge and understanding must be objective and rational and elucidates powers s idea that fiction can be a powerful tool for integrating various kinds of knowledge



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
