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diaspora constitutes a powerful descriptor for the modern condition of the contemporary poet the spokesperson for the psyche of america the poems in american diaspora poetry of displacement focus on the struggles and pleasures of creating a home physical and mental out of displacement exile migration and alienation to fully explore the concept of diaspora the editors have broadened the scope of their definition to include not only the physical act of moving and immigration but also the spiritual and emotional dislocations that can occur as for emily dickinson and other poets even in a life spent entirely in one location more than one hundred and thirty contemporary poets reflect and mediate rage and bliss as they tell their own stories in short this is an anthology of american poetry that draws upon the sensitivity tenderness rebelliousness patience and spirituality that point to the future of our nation

every poem in this collection offers a stepping stone or resting place on what is eventually a diasporic odyssey mishra s is a poetry of discontinuities of sojourning of not staying put it traces the lines of an eccentric cartography moving restlessly from fiji to scotland to australia to new zealand to malta to italy and back it is similarly unsettled in its approach to motifs and forms a sequence of sonnets jostles with a terza rima free verse stands alongside a sufi parable there are poems about poetry colonialism photography food palestine the pacific and most of all about people

diaspora is witnessing a murder without getting blood on your shirt winner of the forward prize for best first collection finalist for the sunday times young writer of the year award winner of the sky arts award for poetry exceptional mehri is a truly transnational poet of the twenty first century bernardine evaristo author of girl woman other a once in a generation poet caleb femi author of poor the definition of diaspora is the dispersion of people from their original homeland but what does it mean to write diaspora poetry momtaza mehri s debut collection poses this question taking us from mogadishu to naples lampedusa to london mixing her own family s experience with the stories of many others across nineteenth and twentieth century somalia bad diaspora poems confronts the ambivalent nature of speaking for those who have been left behind we meet the poet the translator the refugee the exile and the diaspora kid attempting to transcend their clichéd angst told in lyric prose and text messages and taking place in living rooms and marketplaces on buses and balconies on transatlantic journeys and online these are essential poems about our diasporic age

over the last twenty years or so it seems as if the indian diaspora has suddenly come of age shedding its minority status it has demonstrated its inclination for becoming a majority not in the sense of numerical superiority but of growing up maturing attaining self apprehension and self expression it can now look at itself the host country and the homeland with a critical humor that has not necessarily dulled its passion or lessened the intensity of its engagement moreover the indian diaspora has become an important economic force whose reputed net worth exceeds hundreds of billions of dollars it is at once more mobile and cohesive than ever before what with faster means of travel and communication not only has the old diaspora made inroads into the new but the access of all the scattered peoples of indian origin to india the motherland has also increased dramatically now it actually seems as if this diaspora has an unprecedented ascendancy and leverage both in the host country and the homeland perhaps its days of impossible mourning to use vijay mishra s phrase might at last be at an end

the fifty eight writers included in this new sourcebook have roots in india or less frequently in pakistan bangladesh or sri lanka but represent diverse geographical areas of the indian diaspora from the south pacific to south america from the indian ocean islands of mauritius and singapore to the cities and suburbs of london new york johannesburg and toronto their lives works themes and critical receptions are examined individually but with attention to two central assumptions that people of the indian diaspora share a diasporic consciousness generated by a complex network of historical connections spiritual affinities and unifying racial memories and that this shared sensibility is manifested in the cultural productions of the indian diasporic communities around the world these concepts developed by professor nelson in a previous study reworlding the literature of the indian diaspora are here applied to a larger canvas of writers including major international figures such as v s naipaul and salman rushdie and talented emerging writers the writers practice a variety of literary forms and represent a extraordinary diversity of ethnicities languages and religious traditions the women among them contribute the perspective of gender along with the themes of ethnicity migrancy and post coloniality shared with the male writers each entry begins with relevant biographical information on the writer offers an interpretive summary of the major works provides an overview of the critical reception accorded the corpus and individual productions and concludes with detailed primary and secondary bibliographies a brief appendix lists each writer with place of birth and places of domicile the introduction to the volume by professor nalini natarajan discusses several theoretical issues pertinent to indian diasporic studies of value to all literary collections and scholars this reference work will be of special interest for post colonial and commonwealth studies

beginning with an analysis of the abolitionist narratives of eighteenth and nineteenth century ex slaves olaudah equiano and harriet jacobs chinsole traces the political and aesthetic linkages between these early writings and autobiographical literature produced by writers in the twentieth century namely richard wright peter abrahams george lamming agostinho neto audre lorde assata shakur and evelyn williams
