children with incarcerated parents are at risk for a variety of problematic outcomes yet research has rarely examined protective factors or resilience processes that might mitigate such risk in this population in this volume we present findings from fi ve new studies that focus on child or family level resilience processes in children with parents currently or recently incarcerated in jail or prison in the fi rst study empathic responding is examined as a protective factor against aggressive peer relations for 210 elementary school age children of incarcerated parents the second study further examines socially aggressive behaviors with peers with a focus on teasing and bullying in a sample of 61 children of incarcerated mothers emotion regulation is examined as a possible protective factor the third study contrasts children s placement with maternal grandmothers versus other caregivers in a sample of 138 mothers incarcerated in a medium security state prison the relation between a history of positive attachments between mothers and grandmothers and the current cocaregiving alliance are of particular interest the fourth study examines coparenting communication in depth on the basis of observations of 13 families with young children whose mothers were recently released from jail finally in the fi fth study the proximal impacts of a parent management training intervention on individual functioning and family relationships are investigated in a diverse sample of 359 imprisoned mothers and fathers taken together these studies

further our understanding of resilience processes in children of incarcerated parents and their families and set the groundwork for further research on child development and family resilience within the context of parental involvement in the criminal justice system

provides basic information that is essential to the delivery of safe comprehensive and holistic nursing care to children and their families

the author of such classic works as *The Republican Roosevelt* and *Was for Victory* and *Years of Discord* John Morton Blum is one of a small group of intellectuals who for more than a quarter of a century dominated the writing of American political history. Writing now of his own career, Blum provides a behind-the-scenes look at Ivy League education and political power from the 1940s to the 1980s. Blum insightfully recounts a long and distinguished journey that began at Phillips Academy where he first realized he could make a career of teaching and writing history. He tells how young men were socialized to the values of the northeastern establishment in those years before World War II and how, as a non-practicing Jew, he learned to overcome bigotry both at Andover and at Harvard which then had no Jewish professors. In 1957 Blum joined the faculty of Yale University's history department, widely regarded as the nation's best where he became both influential and popular and where his students included one future U.S. president as well as others who aspired to the office. He reveals much about the inner workings of Ivy League education and tells of controversies over the Vietnam War and the Black Panthers, his role in the Eugene McCarthy presidential campaign and how he searched for common ground between reactionary faculty and radical students. More than a recounting of a singular life, Blum's story explains how political history was researched and written during the second half of the twentieth century, describing how the discipline evolved, gained ascendancy and was challenged as historical fashions changed. It also offers revealing glimpses of such prominent academics as Kingman Brewster, Arthur Schlesinger Jr., C. Vann Woodward and William Sloan Coffin. Over a distinguished career, Blum witnessed considerable change in elite educational institutions where minorities and women were grossly underrepresented. When he first entered academia in a memoir brimming with insight and laced with humor, he looks back at the academy not a refuge from reality but an alternative reality as he reflects upon his intellectual journey and his contributions to the study and writing of twentieth-century American history.

Most Americans believe that local school districts are the only means by which citizens may exercise control over public education. Kathryn McDermott argues to the contrary that existing local institutions are no longer sufficient for achieving either equity or democratic governance. Not only is local control inequitable, it also fails to live up to its reputation for guaranteeing public participation and citizen influence. Drawing upon democratic theory and the results of field research in New Haven, Connecticut and three suburbs, McDermott contends that our educational system can be made more democratic by centralizing control.

over funding while decentralizing most authority over schools to the level of schools themselves while enacting public school choice controlled for racial balance to many people in connecticut and elsewhere the tension between equal opportunity for all students and local control of public education seems impossible to resolve in 1996 the connecticut supreme court ruled in sheff v o neill that local control produces unconstitutional segregation of public schools nearly all of the state s 169 towns operate their own public schools and like the towns they serve the schools are generally homogeneous with respect to race and socioeconomic class in the sheff ruling the court declared that making school districts coterminous with town lines is the single most important factor contributing to the present concentration of racial and ethnic minorities in the hartford public school system at the same time the court also acknowledged that the town based school system presently furthers the legitimate nonracial interests of permitting considerable local control and accountability in educational matters in connecticut and elsewhere it has often seemed necessary to choose between local control and equity in public education and local control has almost always won mcdermott argues that rather than seeing local control and equity as conflicting goals policymakers should regard them as equally important components of democracy in public education in her view a truly democratic system of education should both encourage citizen participation in school governance and contribute to the formation and maintenance of a social order in which equality of opportunity prevails over hierarchies of privilege centralizing distribution of resources and using controlled choice to end racial isolation would provide greater equality of opportunity while decentralizing management of schools would expand citizen participation mcdermott s conclusions break new ground in our understanding of local school governance itself and call into question the conventional wisdom about local participation these findings should interest those who study school governance and reform especially in an urban setting as well as policy makers administrators teachers students and citizens eager to improve their schools
